ACTFL Language Proficiency Assessments

Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi is an official testing site for the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) Oral Proficiency Interview (OPI) test. Students who have taken an ACTFL OPI, OPIc, or Writing Proficiency Test (WPT) through Language Testing International (LTI) and who received a proficiency rating by LTI may receive course credits.

EXAM INFORMATION

A student can choose to take the exam with a web-based proctor or at the university. The ACTFL Oral Proficiency Interview takes between 25 – 45 minutes to complete over a telephone interview with an ACTFL Certified Tester. The interview is interactive and adaptive to the experiences and linguistic competence of the candidate. Prior to starting the registration process, a candidate should consult with the Office of Academic Testing about the availability of testing times.

COST

The candidate will purchase their exam and create an account with LTI, [Language Testing International](#).

TEST DAY

On the day of the test, the candidate reports to the Corpus Christi Hall, Room 124 and presents a form of personal identification; this must be a government-issued photo ID card.

RE-TEST

ACTFL/LTI requires a minimum of 90 days between a test and a retest.
