# First group of freshmen register for Fall 1994

On April 8, 45 students from throughout the state registered as freshmen at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi for the fall semester of 1994. During the day students and their parents received orientation on the programs and services of the campus.

University President Robert Furgason, in opening remarks to students and their parents, stated, "We are working to integrate what students learn here with real world experiences." He added, "There will be an emphasis on establishing close relationships between the freshmen class and senior faculty.

After an intitial welcoming session, students and parents went through separate orientation programs.

The next scheduled freshman orientation is set for June 10 when 71 freshmen are scheduled to register. Another 60 freshmen are slated to register June 11. Additional registration dates for freshmen are set for July 8 and 30.

## Melvyn N. Klein to address **TAMU-CCSpringGraduates**

Melvyn N. Klein, international investor, attorney and entrepreneur whose diverse interests include cofounding two major motion picture companies, will address the 1994 Spring candidates for graduation from Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi May 13. The commencement ceremony, to be held at Memorial Coliseum beginning at 7:30 p.m., marks only the second time students will graduate from Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi, formerly Corpus Christi State University.

Klein was among the youngest ever to be named to the board of directors and executive committee of a major New York Stock Exchange-listed company when a vas so named at age 28. Klein is currently president of JAKK Holding

Corporation, which is a general partner of GKH Partners, L.P. While relatively low-profile in Corpus Christi, Klein became well-known on Wall Street and in international financial circles in the late 1980's when GKH was a major participant in the takeover battle for RJR Nabisco and later became major investors in American Medical International, Inc.; London Fog Corporation; Santa Fe Energy Resources, Inc., Hanover Compressor Corporation and Cockrell Oil & Gas, L.P.

Another notable GKH investment is Savoy Pictures Entertainment, Inc., a major motion picture company that recently released "Shadowlands," which received two Academy Award nominations this year. Savoy will soon release "No Escape" and has just obtained the rights to Tom Clancy's bestseller, "Without Remorse." Savoy also recently announced a significant relationship with Andy Davis, director of "The Fugitive.

Klein received his bachelor's degree in economics with highest honors from Colgate

University. He was a General Motors National Scholar, New York State College Debating Champion, recipient of the Julius Turner Memorial Award in American Studies and received numerous other schol-See "Klein" on page 4

# First Presidential Scholarship awarded to Suzanne Weidner

It was not only \$24,000 that drew Suzanne Weidner to the Island Uni-

"I chose it because it's a small campus and I wasn't ready for 400 people in a class," said Weidner. The decision to attend Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi was not made lightly; Weidner was also accepted to Tulane University in New Orleans, Trinity University in San Antonio and Texas A&M University in College Station. Weidner said she decided to attend TAMU-CC because of its environmental science program and the University's unique setting surrounded by a "living laboratory.'

Weidner, a senior at East Central High School in San Antonio, will be TAMU-CC's first Presidential Scholarship recipient for the fall of 1994. The \$24,000 award will be dispersed over the next four years. The award is funded through the TAMU-CC President's Council.

Weidner said she was excited about the University's potential growth and the rapidly expanding environmental science program. She found it hard to contain her excitement about the University's student housing, the new Miramar Apart-

Weidner is third in her class at East Central where she has been involved in many actitivities. She is president of the Beta Club, a service organization, vice president of National Honor Society, and is a varsity swimmer. Earlier this week Weidner competed in the State Science Fair and is advancing to Nationals. Weidner's project is a twoyear study that concerned metal content in the San Antonio River.

Three incoming freshmen have been offered \$10,000 scholarships to be spread out over four years at TAMU-CC. The students are Stacy Crocker from Bartlesville, Oklahoma. Kathryn Allen from Commerce, Texas, and James Walker from Corpus Christi, Texas.

"The university seeks additional funds for scholarships through individual corporations and foundations," says Vice President for Insitutional Advancement Ken DeDominicis. Those interested in supporting scholarships at TAMU-CC can contact the Office of Institutional Advancement at 994-2420.

### More grant funding doors opened University receives Minority Institution designation

Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi has been designated a Minority Institution by the U.S. Department of Education. The designation allows the university to submit applications for grants under the Strengthening Institutions Program, the Endowment Challenge Grant Program and other programs. According to Grants Director Dr. Sylvester Peterson this greatly adds to the university's ability to secure grant funds.

'In achieving this status, we are eligible to participate in grant competitions that will greatly enhance our ability to secure funds exclusively targeted for minority institutions," says Peterson.

"This is part of our master plan to bring resources to the community and benefit everyone in the community," says TAMU-CC Vice Presi-

more doors with such agencies as the U.S. Department of Education. the National Science Foundation, Department of Defense, the Office of Naval Research and numerous other agencies.

This designation also opens avenues to joint venture funds for the university and area school districts. Peterson says "If we are to take greater advantage of some of these joint venture opportunities we can certainly increase our partnerships with area school districts."

The TAMU-CC Grants Office reports \$2 million in grant awards have been received by the University this academic year. Peterson adds that more than \$12 million in grant applications have been submitted. The Grants Office expects to prepare more than \$4 million worth of additional proposals this academic year.

Persons interested in learning more about various grant opportunities should use the Grants Office resource library. School personnel should contact Peterson for more information or contact the funding agencies directly. Peterson notes that partnerships between schools and TAMU-CC must involve TAMU-CC faculty. "It seems that almost unlimited opportunities exist," he says.

# University Cinema continues season

University Cinema concludes its Wednesday, April 27 and May 4. On April 27, the film that boosted Sam Peckinpah into Hollywood fame, The Wild Bunch, will be shown. This film, produced in 1969, is one of the most controversial Westerns ever made. It is the story of the end of an era for the pistol-

packing bandits that once ruled Robert Ryan and Bo Hopkins. It is rated R.

The final film in the classic series is El Norte, directed by Gregory Nava. The film tells the story of two young Guatemalens who travel to America in search of the "American Dream." # Early Education - the key to reducing heart disease

Cardiovascular diseases remain the leading cause of death in the United States, responsible for more than 900,000 deaths each year. According to the American Heart Association (AHA), lifestyle habits that increase a person's risk for heart disease may have been learned at an early age.

To promote healthier lifestyles among young people, the AHA is launching a nationwide effort throughout February, American Heart month, to encourage children and their families to take care of their hearts. This year's theme, "Make Exercise a Family Affair," emphasizes the AHA's belief that effective education in childhood may improved cardiovascular health in adult life.

Combining poor nutrition habits with lack of physical activity, young people are establishing lifestyles that may result in increased numbers of deaths related to heart disease in decades to come. Along with not smoking, children should learn to safeguard their hearts with regular exercise, healthy eating and weight control. Active lifestyles in children promote lower blood pressure, improved psychological well-being and a predisposition to increased physical activity as adults which may translate into longer life and decreased risk of cardiovascular diseases. Healthy physical activity guidelines (as outlined in the AHA medical/scientific statement special report, "Integrated Cardiovascular Health Promotion in Childhood," 1992) for children include:

Regular walking, bicycling or outdoor play.

Participation in age-appropriate sports, lessons or clubs.

Daily school exercise that includes a minimum of 20 minutes of coordinated large muscle exercise, e.g. running and jumping.

Regular participation in household chores

Family outings that involve walking, cycling, swimming or other recreational activities.

Positive role modeling for a physically active lifestyle by parents, teachers or other caretakers

The benefits of these lifestyle habits learned in childhood may not be realized until adulthood, but the maintenance of a healthy lifestyle may prevent an excessive increase in weight, sedentary activity, high blood pressure and cholesterol levels characteristic of many people in their thirties and forties. For those of us in our thirties and forties, it's never too late to incorporate those heart healthy habits in our daily routine

He was a member of former Vice President Hubert Humphrey's 1968 presidential campaign staff. He is a member of the International Board of Advisors of the Institute for Social and Economic Policy in the Middle East at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard

University as well as a member of the International Advisory Board of Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs.

He is a former chairman of the Board of Governing Trustees of the Art Museum of South Texas and is an officer and trustee of the Foundation of Sciences and Arts, which gave The Watergarden in the Bayfront Arts and Science Park to the City of Corpus Christi.

"An important factor in what I've been able to do in life is related to higher education," says Klein.
