CCSU, A&I, Pan Am presidents like new proposal

The presidents of Corpus Christi State. Texas A&I and Pan American universities are happy with the latest plan in Austin to

seek a four-year college here. But the president of Del Mar College urged that local legislators exercise caution

Six South Texas legislators met behind closed doors yesterday and emerged with this consensus, that legislation will be introduced this session to create a comprehensive university system in South Texas and make CCSU a four-year institut on.

Both B. Alan Sugg, CCSU president and interim chancellor of the University System of South Texas, and Texas A&I University president Steven Altman said they were "very pleased and excited" about the

Miguel Navarez, Pan American University president, said he fully supports a four-year CCSU and a comprehensive South Texas university system

Del Mar College president Ed Biggerstaff said while he isn't against a four-year university, he believes a cautious and studied approach should be taken before a major decision is made

"It will open a potentially tremendous development in higher education for South Texas," said Sugg "It will enable both CCSU and A&I to offer both doctoral and professional degree programs at some future date."

Sugg said a four-year university at Corpus Christi would have a positive effect on all of South Texas.

"This means the South Texas delegation and the Valley delegation can work together to create two comprehensive systems, said Sugg.

Mayor Luther Jones said the proposed legislation to make CCSU a four-year insti-

tution was good news for the city
"I'm absolutely delighted" the mayor said "The most important reason is to provide the educational opportunity for

One system would include CCSU, A&I and Laredo State. The other system would include Pan American University at Edinburg and a branch campus at Brownsville.

Sugg said the idea of two comprehensive systems is not out of line, considering the geographical area.

South Texas and the Valley deserves to have more than a single system. There are two comprehensive universities alone at Denton - North Texas State and Texas Woman's University," said Sugg.

Sugg said general appropriations this year for CCSU, A&I, Laredo State and Pan American total \$36 million, while North Texas was appropriated \$39 million and Texas Tech's medical school, \$34 million The facts are overwhelming. South Tex-

as has absolutely been left out in funding for higher education," said Sugg. "We only are asking for what South Texas deserves. A&I's Altman said he is pleased the

South Texas delegation had gotten together

because unity will make things happen.

"The comprehensive system will be good for South Texas. If approved, we can begin moving forward for improving the educational opportunities at each institution," said Altman.

He said the proposed legislation would open the door for careful development and advancement of graduate and professional degree programs for South Texas

This will allow us to use our established base at Texas A&I to improve and expand plans for the future," said Altman.

Biggerstaff said if a bill is introduced, he

would expect the legislative delegation to give responsible consideration to protecting

"I would like to know what kind of timetable, if any, has been set for implementa-tion of CCSU as a four-year institution. Would this be phased in? Would admission standards be changed at CCSU?" Biggerstaff asked. "Would there be coordination with Del Mar regarding programs? Would

state funding be appropriately maintained during a recovery period due to potential enrollment decreases at Del Mar'

Pan American's Navarez said the Valley institution has always supported a four-year CCSU and a comprehensive university system for South Texas, the same being proposed for Pan American.

'We need to coordinate all the educational programs for the Valley and South Texa ' said Navarez.

Navarez also said cooperation is needed between Valley and Corpus Christi area legislators.

"This announcement will give all of us a better chance for appropriations than we had two days ago," said Navarez.

The legislators who agreed to the plan include Sen. Carlos Truan and Reps. Hugo Berlanga, Eddie Cavazos and Ted Roberts; all of Corpus Christi; Rep. Irma Rangel of Kingsville; and Rep. Ernestine Glossbrenner of Alice

Truan also acknowledged after the meeting that he hasn't given up on his idea of adding Pan American University to a new comprehensive University System of South Texas.

The Corpus Christi Democrat said he has met with state Sens Hector Uribe, D-Brownsville, and Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, and understands their effort to have Pan American designated as a comprehensive university separate from the University System of South Texas.

For that reason. Truan said he has moved the idea to the back burner.

Legislation already has been drafted to bring Pan American into the University System of South Texas should Uribe and Zaffirini's effort falter during the legislative session, he said.

Truan added that he would need Uribe's and Zaffirini's support before he would introduce the bill.

Without Pan American, the system would include only those schools now in the system - Texas A&I, CCSU and Laredo State.

But bringing the two boards together, Truan said, would better serve the educational needs of all of South Texas.

Truan also said in a prepared

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handout that the distance between the Rio Grande Valley and Corpus Christi and Laredo would prevent a comprehensive Pan American Unig versity from meeting all the region's higher education needs.

Other major points in Truan's handout called for

■ The system board to consider and to minimize any adverse impact on Del Mar College and Texas A&I if CCSU is elevated to a four-

year school

The regents to reduce any doplication of programs among the schools by creating a master plate showing which universities would offer which graduate- or profession, al-degree programs

■ The master plan to be submi ted to the Texas Legislature by Sept. 1, 1988, and that any plan should "strive to utilize fully the existing facilities and resources of component institutions.

A study of higher-education needs in South Texas that might include a look at additional degree programs needed, new strategies for providing higher education to minorities, "distinctive yet comple-" mentary missions for each of the component institutions," and expanding each school's research ca-,

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
