According to John Carballa, meteorologist at the National Weather Service, International Airport, the winds are being · whipped up by a high pressure center over the Gulf of Mexico and a countering low pressure center over Northern Mexico. A high pressure ridge has formed along the Texas coast and extends probably as far south as Veracruz, Mexico, Carballa said.

"It's the normal forces at work again, but in larger quantities," Carballa added a cold front centered over northern Texas last night was having a funneling effect on local winds, but not enough to consider important. 


