Students vote down new recreation fee

When the 411 ballots cast in the recent student recreational sports fee vote were tallied, 276 students had voted "No" to the new fee and 135 had voted "Yes," placing CCSU student opinion 2-1 against the proposed fee.

Students cast their votes in the March 10-11 referendum on the proposed fee. If passed, the recreational sports fee would have added a new fee of \$10 per long semester and \$5 per short semester.

CCSU students Mark Mueller and Anne Mokry (pictured right) were two voters who marked ballots. "I voted yes," Mokry said, because the recreational sports fee (would) provide the needed funds for equipment and intramurals in the upcoming years."

The CCSU Student Government had come out against the fee, distributing "Vote No" flyers around campus to express their opposition.

We were against the fee first because we did not have enough time to debate the issue and get all the facts," states Student Body President Chris Munson. "Secondly, we felt it was not an equitable fee since it would only be going to one part of student services. There are other areas that need funds as well '

Funds generated by the fee would have been restricted to use within the recreational sports department and the intramural program. According to Ann Stein, director of Intramurals, and Ray Trainer, recreational facilities supervisor, such funds would have been used to expand sports programs, extend facility hours and obtain additional equipment.

The current overall recreational sports budget-including salaries, programs and operation/maintenance of facilities-totals \$120,000 according to Dr. Eliot Chenaux, See "Rec fee vote," page 4.

For Summer I, Summer II, Fall '92:

Early registration starts April

For the first time since on-line registration was introduced at CCSU, the upcoming campaign, April 13-30, will be a three-in-one registration event.

Students can avoid the long-line, closed-class problems of regular and late registration by participating in early registration for the next three sessions: Summer Session I, Summer Session II and Fall

Just shy of three weeks long, the early registration process allows students to select and reserve classes for both summer sessions plus the fall semester.

Personalized early registration letters are slated for mailing from the Office of the Registrar on April 1. The letters include each student's registration date and time,

any "holds" incurred by students and placed by campus offices, as well as detailed instructions explaining how to take advantage of early registration.

The first step in early registration is to pick up a Class Scheduling Form (CSF) at the Registrar's Office in the Administration Building. CSFs will be available beginning April 8 along with class schedules for Summer 1992 and Fall 1992. The schedules may be picked up in the Administration Building either at the Office of Public Information or Office of Admissions.

The next step is to clear any and all "holds" indicated on the CSF by contacting the appropriate of-fice. "Holds" are printed in the upper right corner of a student's CSF as well as on their registration letter. For example, if a student's CSF shows "Holds: Admission," they should check with the Office of Admissions to determine the nature of the hold and find out how to clear it.

Before completing the CSF, students are encouraged to seek advisement in selecting courses by setting up appointments with faculty members or degree coordinators in their respective colleges.

After selecting classes and filling out the CSFs, students may register in the Faculty Center Conference Room A. (Please note the change in location; early registration is no longer held in the college dean's suites.) Each student's CSF has an individual registration date and time printed in the upper left-hand corner. Students may register on or after the time noted on their CSF, but not before.

Extended hours are being offered during all three weeks of early registration. They are: 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Thursday; 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, and 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. on Friday, between April 13 and 30. A poet and essayist, Ruiz has scheduled a series of creative writing workshops open to students, staff and the public throughout the week. Her campus visit will culminate in a free, public reading of her works on March 27 in Wilson Studio Theatre at 8 p.m.

Talking Razzmatazz is this prolific author's first published book of poetry, and Friday's public reading will no doubt include poems from this 1991 collection. Ruiz has had over two dozen poems published as well as three fiction and two non-fiction works.

Chamber Trio performs Mar. 30

CCSU's Distinguished Visitors in the Arts series concludes the 1991-92 season with a performance by the American Chamber Trio March 30 at 8:15 p.m. The concert in Warren Theatre is free and open to the public.

Acclaimed by critics as sensitive and persuasive artists, the American Chamber Trio has appeared nationally and internationally since 1975. The ensemble features June DeForest on the violin, Daniel Morganstern, cellist, and Eric Larsen on piano. They have given three series of concerts at Carnegie Recital Hall, appeared at Alice Tully Hall in Lincoln Center and performed throughout the United States as well as in Europe, South America and the Far East.

Violinist June DeForest was appointed concertmaster for the Joffrey Ballet and the Canadian Opera shortly after graduation from the Manhattan School of Music. In addition to being a violinist with the Lyric Opera of Chicago and the American Ballet Theatre in New York, DeForest was appointed the Drushal Distinguished Visiting Professor of Music for 1990-91 at The College of Wooster in Ohio.

Daniel Morganstern is currently principal cellist for the Lyric Opera of Chicago and the American Ballet Theatre in New York and has held the same position in the Aspen Festival Orchestra, the Joffrey Ballet and the American National Opera. He first received recognition at the age of sixteen when he

was awarded a scholarship by the Juilliard School of Music.

Eric Larsen, acclaimed equally for his solo and chamber music performances, was invited by the USSR to present two recitals at the Moscow conservatory in Januar, 1991. A graduate of Manhatta School of Music, he is on the North Carolina School of Arts faculty.

Cinema classics continue

CCSU's University Cinema runs the gamut of emotion over the next two weeks with an Italian classic on the horrors of war and a 1950s musical comedy. The screenings are free and open to the public each Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. in Warren Theatre, Center for the Arts.

The horrors of war and the passions and miseries of life in Nazioccupied Rome are portrayed in Rome: Open City (1945, 103 min.) March 25. A towering achievement of Italian neorealist cinema, the film is based on fact and shot where the events depicted actually took place. Director Rossellini recreates the attempts of the city's inhabitants to regain their freedom in this powerful film.

Rome: Open City, subtitled in English, stars Anna Magnani, Aldo Fabrizi and Marcello Pagliero.

On April 1, cinema enthusiasts can get on The Band Wagon (1953, 111 min.). A washed-up movie idol (Fred Astaire), a prima ballerina (Cvd Charisse) and a busy producer (Jack Buchanan) combine to put on a Broadway show which turns into a pompous musical version of the Faust legend. Complications during rehearsals result in a general swipe at the rampant egos of theatrical people and their machinations. Eventually they get on track and produce a knock-out musical, which includes a spoof of Mickey Spillane novels.

The Band Wagon also stars Oscar Levant, Nanette Fabray, Jack Buchanan and James Mitchell and features highly imaginative choreography by Michael Kidd.

interim dean of students. The proposed recreational sports fee was estimated to generate around \$90,000.

"Right now student service fees fund the recreational program," explained Chenaux. "With additional funds from a recreational sports fee available to help build the rec program, it is possible that a portion of these student services fees could have been freed up to be used in other student service areas."

While the proposed fee was not passed by students during the recent referendum, the option may be revisited in the future, according to the Dean of Student's office.
