No state funds postpones planning at area colleges

Critical budget planning at Corpus Christi State University, Texas A&I and Del Mar College has stopped until the Legislature comes

.up with some money.

"It really is a tragedy for higher education and for the state in gener-al not knowing what to expect out of Austin," said CCSU president

"We faced the same situation last year," he said. "This will be the second straight year we won't know

what funds will be available." "We are suspended in uncertainty. The uncertainty can have terrible results," said A&I president

Steven Altman. "The situation also hasn't helped our faculty," he said. "We haven't been able to grant raises in two years. We are likely to continue losing faculty members if we contin-ually face the budget problem."

"We can't do anything until we see what happens in the special session," said Del Mar College president Ed Biggerstaff. "We can't do much budget preparation until under the circumstances.

The Legislature will convene in special session on June 22 to begin working anew on an appropriations bill for the next biennium.

All state-supported institutions operate under a fiscal year of Sept. 1 to Aug. 31.

Last year, the three institutions already had adopted budgets when a special session was called and state funds were slashed to meet a

revenue shortage.


The CCSU budget for the 1986-87 fiscal year was cut by about \$850,000. A&I suffered a \$1.2 million reduction, while Laredo State was hit with a \$265,000 cut. Del Mar's budget was cut by \$1.3 mil-

Sugg also is interim chancellor for the University of South Texas. The system is responsible for operating CCSU, Texas A&I, and Laredo State University.

The board of directors was scheduled to meet in July for approval of the budgets, but we have postponed the meeting until August," said Sugg. "I hope we know something from Austin by that

Sugg said that, in the meantime, none of the universities can sign contracts for any purpose, including those for purchases or for person-

"We are in limbo," said Sugg. "We don't have any feeling of what the new appropriations bill will


Trash collection is scheduled

next week in the area north of Kinney-Agnes, including Corpus Christi Beach and the Annaville-Calallen area.


Small trash and debris will be collected Wednesday where garbage is normally collected Tuesday and Friday
